



Georgetown October 27: 1816.

Beloved Father in the Gospel,

At the request of a number of the brethren, who met yesterday for Monthly Conference, (notwithstanding the Violent rain) I write to request you to make us a Visit.

The Elders and brethren attended a Conference with us on Monday after Quarterly Meeting, and there appeared a better prospect of our uniting in love than there has been these five Years
